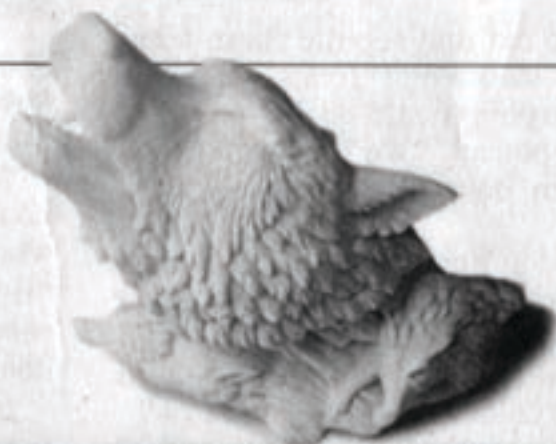

### A Found-Artist Takes a Break From Dish Rehab

Sarah Cihat, above, a Brooklyn designer known for printing abandoned dishes with images of rock stars, animals and crossbones, now has a collection all her own. Called Dirt, the hand-cast porcelain pieces include vases with dogwood blossoms (\$450 to \$650), cups and bowls with a stonelike surface (\$60 to \$95) and decorative wolf heads (\$500). The dogwood motif is from Ms. Cihat's childhood in Tennessee; the rest she imagined. "I needed an outlet during all the dish rehabbing," she said. She also has, with Joya Candle of Brooklyn, a line of candles with screen-print images of skulls, horses and anchors (\$75).
